FROM THE ASSISTANT TO THE RECTOR

It's not uncommon for me to work late. Maybe a couple of times a week, I'll be in my office long after the sun has gone down. Most of the time I'm working feverishly on my computer, but occasionally, I'll traipse upstairs to post a sign-up sheet on a bulletin board or to sneak cookies out of the kitchen. On those nights, when the church is dark and still, there is a tiny flicker of light that catches my eye every time I pass the doors to the nave. It's the faint flame just to the right of the altar—the light that marks the presence of Christ in the consecrated host.

More than once I've paused and thought about the beauty of this light. When the room is dark and empty, the small flame casts light to the far reaches of the nave. I'm amazed by the reach of such a small flame, and I'm even more amazed that someone at St. Peter's manages to remember to keep it going.

I was particularly grateful for that flame this past week. The day before St. Peter's grand High Tea, my grandfather suffered a heart attack. It was mild enough that he was awake and alert, and we were able to talk for a while on Sunday night.

"How's it going, Grandpa?" I asked as I collapsed onto my bed.

"Oh, you know. The food here's not so bad. I asked for three strips of bacon. They reminded me that I'm in the cardio ward. I said, 'All right. How about pork sausage?'"

"That's my Grandpa!" I said laughing. "The model patient!"

Our phone call lasted longer than usual that night. I can't help but imagine that my grandfather knew something serious was going to happen. He asked about me—if I'm going to become a priest, if the church pays me enough, what the heck the military is going to do with me. "I think you should stay in the Reserves," he told me for the first time. He's always been so proud of military service that his words both surprised and relieved me. I hadn't realized this was something I'd wanted him to say for a long time.

After a while we got around to talking about my sisters and cousins—his twelve other grandchildren.

"Stephie seems to be doing well—straight A's, I'm told. And I just talked to Taylor, who seems to be figuring it out in California."

"Sounds like you've been getting a lot of phone calls and visitors, Grandpa."

"Oh yeah. Around here, in the hospital...there is no peace!"

I laughed. "Well, maybe I should let you get some rest."

"I suppose so. My phone is beeping at me anyway. Grandma's bringing the charger."

"I love you, Grandpa."

"Love you too."

The next morning my Grandpa went in for an angiogram. The doctors found four arteries with major blockages. They put a stent in one, but when they tried to insert a stent in the next artery, they found that it was too old and too blocked. So they decided to stop the procedure and give him his options once he woke up from the anesthesia.

It's been over a week since the angiogram, and my grandfather hasn't yet woken up. When the doctors noticed that something was wrong, they rushed him to a hospital that specializes in neurology for fear that he might have had a stroke. They continue to put him through tests.

When I heard the news I found myself drawn to that small flame above the ambry. It's such a small thing, so easily unnoticed and forgotten. But in my moment of sadness and worry, its light was bright enough to pierce the darkness and guide me toward the light of Christ.

Maybe there are others at St. Peter's who are beginning the Advent season with a sense of deep sadness or personal loss. May these words be a comfort to you as they have been to me:

In the beginning was the Word, and the Word was with God, and the Word was God. He was in the beginning with God. All things came into being through him, and without him not one thing came into being. What has come into being in him was life, and the life was the light of all people. The light shines in the darkness, and the darkness did not overcome it.

May we take comfort in this light that burns in the darkest night and remember that God has given us the task of tending to that light, of making sure that the flame continues to burn bright, even if no one ever notices.

MISSION NEWS —

Sign-up sheets are in the Narthex (Mission bulletin board near the door to the kitchen) to sign up for the mission trip to the Dominican Republic. Several parishioners are organizing the trip for June 30 through July 8 of 2012. The trip is a follow-on to the last trip we made there in 2009. The new trip would probably focus on the same school, where there is a need for a second floor. The mission might also work on a playground for the school. The cost per person for the trip (including airfare) is anticipated to be about \$1,750 and the group is developing their fundraising plan. They are planning to host salsa dance lessons and a fiesta in the near future to fundraise for their trip. Stay tuned for more details!

Thank you to all who participated in our Thanksgiving drive by preparing meals on behalf of Samaritan Ministry of Greater Washington (SMGW) and in this year's CROP Walk.

Our annual collection of Christmas gifts for the Arlington Housing Corporation has begun. Further information can be found in the Narthex.

The Emergency Winter Shelter opened on November 1. Thank you to all who have already signed up to participate.

The Nets For Life Program continues to fundraise towards the goal of raising 500 nets for countries in Africa to protect communities from malaria. This effort is led by Emily L.

Mission has formed a new subcommittee, led by Anna F., on Mission Funding, which will meet the fourth Tuesday of every month with the goal of developing a comprehensive policy on mission trip funding and execution.

VESTRY NEWS —

Highlights of the November 15, 2011, Vestry Meeting

- Catharine G., Stewardship Campaign Chair, updated the Vestry on the progress of the 2012 Every Member Canvass.
 - Treasurer Don C. presented the Profit and Loss Budget Performance Report for October 2011. The Treasurer noted that there could be a possible shortfall in current pledges because as of October 31, 2011, the Church had received pledge payments of \$604,628, which is about the same as had been received by this time in 2010. In 2010 the total amount of pledge payments was \$752,000 compared with the 2011 expenses of \$787,000.
- The Treasurer also reported that he was in the process of opening up our new bank accounts at United Bank as per the Vestry resolution of September 20, 2011, and subsequent credit line authorization on October 25, 2011.
- The Vestry made plans for its annual retreat in January 2012.
- Vestry member Peter M., who is also the New Legacy Campaign Steering Committee Co-Chair, reported that the Campaign Committee is re-forming to talk about how to raise the additional \$1 million needed to achieve our goal.
- The Rector updated the Vestry on the Building Schematic Design:
 - The schematic designs have been posted to the Web site and on the walls in the Narthex and the Chapel.
 - Notional bids plus markup costs have been received from four general contractors ranging from \$3.4 to 4.3 million, and the Building Schematic Design Team has selected two of the contractors to interview on November 29, 2011.
 - A Dominion Electric Power line easement was found on the 1953 plat going straight through the property where the new construction would be done. While Dominion effectively abandoned the easement in the 1960s, there is no formal record. Therefore the parish may have to seek a formal abandonment from Dominion.
- Eric S., Finance Committee Chair, presented a draft 2012 parish budget created by the Finance Committee.
 - The Finance Committee forecasts a \$40,000-60,000 deficit for 2012 based on 2011 spending of \$775,000 and anticipated total pledges for 2012 of \$735,000.
 - Eric cautioned the Vestry that deficit spending is not sustainable and that significant progress would need to be made, either in generating pledge income or in reducing expenses, to get to a budget that can be supported even for a one-year timeframe.
 - Eric noted that he was fairly confident that the Finance Committee could find \$10,000 in spending cuts to funding for Commissions and Committee programs, but that beyond the Diocesan Pledge and an annual \$30,000 contribution to the Maintenance Reserve, there was little else in the way of discretionary spending.
 - The Vestry discussed ways to address the anticipated shortfall—including spending cuts to programs and staff, a reduction in the Diocesan Pledge and postponement of an annual contribution to the Maintenance Reserve—and how various actions might impact the short- and long-term health of the parish.
 - After discussion, the Vestry directed the Finance Committee to explore options for reducing 2012 spending and report back to the Vestry at its December meeting.

OTHER ITEMS OF INTEREST —

ST. PETER'S LOVE QUILT PROJECT

This past summer my family and I had the opportunity to participate in the mission trip to South Africa. In the year before we left on the trip, Anna Fernau had the vision to bring quilts as gifts for the AIDS orphans living in the home built in Masiphumelele. I volunteered to help make the quilts, which would be crafted by people at St. Peter's and would include artwork produced by children in our Sunday School.

So many people from St. Peter's were involved and deserve to be thanked, including the Rev. Ann Martens, Sara Mulhall, the Sunday School teachers, all the artistic children—who made expressions of love into artwork that the orphaned children would enjoy—and especially all the quilters. We spent months before the trip working with the St. Peter's Sunday School classes and the talented quilting volunteers to assemble the quilts.

The people of the St. Francis Trust were so surprised and touched to receive seven quilts for the home. It was an emotional afternoon when the quilts were wrapped around the children and their house mother, Joyce. Many tears fell and smiles shone as the warmth and glow of the quilts touched everyone in the house. All could feel the presence of the St. Peter's parishioners who helped with the quilts even if they were not able to be there.

On my flight home I began to pray and asked God what we should do to continue the gift of these quilts. Is it possible to keep giving of ourselves and touching the lives of orphans in South Africa? Could these quilts be given to orphaned children in our own hometown? As I asked these questions I began to realize that the most important aspect of the quilts was the art squares and their messages of love—created by children for children to show how to love and support each other. Nelson Mandela once said, "No one is born hating another person because of the color of his skin, or his background, or his religion. People must learn to hate, and if they can learn to hate, they can be taught to love, for love comes more naturally to the human heart than its opposite." I believe that the art squares are a way for us to teach children about the importance of God's love and the power in loving each other. Love is the universal equalizer.

I am now in the process of organizing the St. Peter's Love Quilt project. This involves four subcommittees of people who will help to coordinate each part of the project. The Art Square committee will organize the gathering of art squares by working with children in our community who are interested in creating the artwork and learning how they can love and support the orphaned children. The Kit Assembly committee will gather the quilter volunteers and distribute kits that include a pattern, batting, and the children's art squares. The Storybook committee will create a children's book about the quilts and the orphans. This committee requires many creative individuals who enjoy writing, editing, and production, and who can help with the illustrations. The Quilt Volunteers are the folks who are willing to sew a quilt and donate it to St. Peter's to be given to an orphan.

I must confess that this project started to sound overwhelming, and as if God was asking a bit much of all of us. But there are so many ways for people of all ages and talents to help within our own parish. We have several volunteers already and are encouraged by the enthusiasm everyone has shown. I encourage you to consider joining the fun. I truly believe the potential for the message of God's love to be given to more orphaned children by our church community is absolutely amazing and achievable. God has shown that this can be accomplished.
