FROM THE ASSISTANT TO THE RECTOR

DATES TO NOTE:

**Aspirant → Postulant → Seminarian
→ Candidate → Deacon → Priest.**

On paper, the process of becoming an Episcopal priest is a clear one. There are distinct stages with fancy names that a person must go through in just the right order. As long as you go to the interviews and meet the requirements for each stage, the process is pretty straightforward.

While clear and straightforward sounds like exactly what a process should be, the unfortunate side effect is often inflexibility. This became clear to me when I began seminary without being a postulant (or even an aspirant). As far as everyone else was concerned, the only fancy name I had in the process was spelled T-R-O-U-B-L-E.

So I finally decided to begin the official process toward ordination during my first year of seminary. I worked with my home parish, St. Michael's in Barrington, Illinois, to discern a call to the priesthood. St. Michael's nominated me for postulancy, and a week later, the diocese announced an "ordination Sabbath." To put it simply, this meant that Chicago would consider no new persons for postulancy.

Until recently, that is! After a long wait, the diocese has gotten things moving again. In less than two weeks, I will travel home to Chicago to attend a weekend full of interviews designed to assess all aspirants and move those who are deemed ready to the postulancy stage.

The "ordination Sabbath" lasted for two years, and now that postulancy weekend is less than two weeks away, I confess that I have been asking myself whether or not I have waited well. At times I have been impatient and frustrated—feeling a strange combination of insecurity and entitlement.

And yet, the two-year delay has made me think about what it means to wait.

There is a theologian at the University of Virginia named Charles Mathewes who says that waiting is a fundamental part of the Christian life. Waiting is an ascetic discipline that teaches us "how to inhabit time, how to take time, how to be patient." Mathewes writes:

In the face of an advertising culture that screams at us that we can, indeed must, 'have it all,' and have it all *now*, we have to learn to long, to long for the right 'things.' We must 'be trained by our longings' to understand ourselves and others as beings whose longings, their persistent lacks, are crucial to our being. Indeed, 'the whole life of a good Christian is a holy longing, for we seek a goal unattainable in this world.'¹

I love Mathewes' words, but must admit that I do hope my present goal of being considered for the priesthood is a goal that *is* attainable in this world. Mathewes is not saying that no goals can be met. What he is saying is that even our attainable goals should be goals that are directed and ordered by a deeper, more distant goal; a goal that moves us beyond what we know, see and feel; a goal that is nothing less than the *eschaton* itself. For truly, the ultimate goal for the Christian is union with God through Jesus Christ.

During a recent ordination sermon in the diocese of Virginia, the Very Rev. Timothy Kimbrough, Dean of Christ Cathedral, Nashville, reflected upon that moment in Genesis, just after the fall, when Adam and Eve are hiding and God goes looking for them in "the cool of the evening." Kimbrough says that this is the moment,

the “primal memory” that we are all longing for: to walk with God in the cool of the evening.

But a lot has happened since that moment. The dark nights and the heat of each day have made us weary. We have wandered and run away from the God who walks with us. We have hidden ourselves and disobeyed. We try to forget the memory of the cool evening walk; we pretend it never happened or tell ourselves it’s not what we really want. And yet in those quiet, cool moments when we find ourselves alone, we hear the faint whisper of God and our memory returns.

When I’ve tried to answer the question, “Why has my ordination process been slow and complicated?” I’ve discovered that there are too many factors to take into consideration. So, I am grateful for the words of Mathewes and Kimbrough.

I’ve learned that, in truth, postulancy weekend is not the end of my waiting, for to be a priest is to be a person who knows how to long, how to wait for God. All the paperwork, all the

interviews, all the bureaucratic struggle isn’t so that we can check boxes and cross things off lists. It is training in the act of waiting, for “the priest who waits well is a priest who wears redemption well and who may know the deepest meaning of reconciliation.”

Perhaps the point of the delay in my own ordination process was to teach me how to wait, or perhaps it was simply the whisper of God reminding me that I am not walking alone.

A LOOK BACK AT ST. PETER'S 50TH ANNIVERSARY CELEBRATION

St. Peter's kicked off a year of jubilee celebrations on June 5th. The parish was originally formed in 1961, so this year marks its 50th anniversary. We marked the occasion with joy, recognizing and giving thanks to God for all the people who have come together over the past 50 years in ministry, service, and fellowship at St Peter's.

Bishop David Colin Jones spent the morning with us for the Annual Visitation of the Bishop and we celebrated the feast of Saint Peter and Saint Paul, transferring it from its customary date later in the month. At all three services the congregation prayed a special litany for the anniversary of the church. Bishop Jones celebrated and preached at the 9 a.m. and 11 a.m. services and spoke during the Adult Forum hour. In his remarks at the Forum he encouraged the congregation to press ahead with the building project and expressed both his enthusiasm for the plans and his confidence that we would be able to accomplish them.

The 11 a.m. service included Confirmation and Reception. Jennie Rowe was received into the Episcopal Church as were two parishioners from St. James, Leesburg. This year's confirmands were Justine B., Claire C., John Pierce D., Harrison F., Anna H., Kirsten K., Emily L., Sarah L., Rob M., and Megan Z.

During the service Father Craig introduced some special guests: The Rev. Bruce M., who served as interim rector in 2001-2002; The Rev. Andrew M., rector of St. Mary's, Arlington; Mr. KT J. and Dr. John B., former members of St. Peter's who were present at the parish's beginnings; and Mr. Thomas Gillis, currently Sexton Emeritus at St. Peter's. Mr. Gillis has served as St. Peter's sexton continuously for the past 50 years and was greeted with a standing ovation when he was acknowledged during the service.

A special bulletin was printed for the 11 a.m. service. It contained the litany for anniversary of the parish, a very brief history of the parish, an article by Father Craig reflecting on St. Peter's 50 years of ministry in Arlington, and a recognition of the supporters to date of the New Legacy Campaign. An excerpt from the May 1963 issue of *The Virginia Churchman* with a cover article on St. Peter's was also included.

After the 11 a.m. service the congregation moved to the patio to share in a celebratory picnic. Music, food, storytelling, and fellowship were all present in abundance. There were gifts for the guests and festive decorations. The men's a cappella group sang, long-time parishioners shared their recollections of parish life, and we all ate well, thanks to the work of the 50th Anniversary Committee. Enormous thanks are due to Meta P., Ron A., Gwyneth R., Paddy L., and all those who helped to make the event such a success.

VESTRY NEWS —

Highlights of the June 21, 2011, Vestry Meeting

- The Vestry voted to reaffirm the long-standing parish policy on the use of alcohol at church functions.
- The Vestry formally adopted the existing parish policy on the use of rental equipment.
- The Building and Grounds Commission reported that the two new signs for each side of the driveway should arrive the first week in July. Once the signs are installed, B&G will see how they look and collect feedback before recommending that the Vestry purchase the more expensive, larger signs for Glebe Road.
- The Senior Warden presented the results of the Mid-Year Budget Review, which showed that the budget gap had narrowed to near the break-even point due to increased monthly pledging and decreased expenses. The Vestry voted to adopt this revised budget.
- The Co-Chair of the New Legacy Capital Campaign reported that 207 visits have been completed and nearly \$3 million in pledges have been received. He also reported that the Trustees, the Steering Committee and Finance Committee had met together and unanimously endorsed moving ahead to the next step of the building project, the schematic design phase.
- The Vestry voted unanimously to move forward with the building project. It authorized The Rector and Tony P. to form a Phase 2 Building Committee and to engage Cox, Graae and Spack in the next phase of the building project.
- The Rector described his vision for an Institute of Christian Studies at St. Peter's—a more detailed Christian education program that would be conducted as an evening program for adults and for which a fee would be charged. The Vestry voted to explore the creation of an Institute, with the Rector to report back with a detailed proposal.
- The Vestry discussed the need for a Memorial Garden Fund to support the ongoing maintenance of the Memorial Garden, and agreed to review a proposal from the Building & Grounds Commission at the next meeting.

COMMISSION NEWS —

STEWARDSHIP NEWS

Your Stewardship Committee is already setting to work on the annual pledge campaign, and it's not too late to join us if you'd like to help out. At our June meeting we discussed the timeline and mechanics of the fall campaign. The annual pledging of money to the church is only one segment of Christian stewardship, but it's an important and highly visible one, so we're gearing up for the fall.

The St. Peter's Stewardship Commission is set up to encompass planned giving (through the Generation-to-Generation Fund), annual giving to fund the church's operations (through the annual pledge campaign administered by the Stewardship Committee), and stewardship of the parish's other material resources (through the Building and Grounds Committee and the Vestry's Finance Committee).

The Buildings and Grounds and Finance Committees are well established (although more help is almost always welcome), but it's been a few years since St. Peter's has had an active Stewardship Committee. We're trying to reinvigorate that committee this year. If you'd like to know more, ask any Vestry member, one of the clergy, or Catharine Gibson, this year's pledge drive chair. We will meet again on July 12; interested parties are most welcome.

MISSION COMMISSION NEWS

At the end of the month, 27 people from St. Peter's will be going to South Africa on a mission to help very young children orphaned by HIV/AIDS. This mission will be accomplished through the very hard work of Anna F., her family, and many, many others at St. Peter's. St. Peter's has raised many thousands of dollars to help build a house as part of a program in South Africa to establish foster homes for HIV/AIDS orphans. We partnered with St. Francis Church in South Africa, attended by former St. Peter's parishioners the Higgs family.

Our missionaries include a number of children and teenagers with their families. They will meet the children who have moved into "our" house and will get to know them through play and activities. Other projects include building an outdoor play set, painting at the house, landscaping, and field trips, among many others.

The mission group will be carrying our "love" quilts. These special quilts, one for each child and the housemother, were handmade by a group of parishioners with squares drawn and decorated by the children of St. Peter's. Our parishioners were also assisted by Gretchen G.'s aunt, Vivian P., who made a "log cabin" quilt for the home's housemother.

Keep an eye peeled for a summer project of gathering items needed for the Arlington Street People's Assistance Network (A-SPAN) project of establishing supplies for an apartment for some of their clients.

As always, please remember to look for sign-up sheets in the Narthex for our ongoing projects of driving for Meals-On-Wheels, cooking for So Others Might Eat (SOME), and taking our food donations to the Arlington Food Assistance Center (AFAC).

KICKOFF DINNER REMARKS FROM NEW LEGACY CAMPAIGN CO-CHAIR TOOTIE KUHN

Truly I tell you, if you have faith as small as a mustard seed, you can say to this mountain, "Move from here to there," and it will move. Nothing will be impossible for you.

Matthew 17: 20

Fifty years ago, empowered by the Holy Spirit, the founders of this parish stepped out in faith to create a new community. They literally brought this place into being by living God's first two commandments:

- Love the Lord your God with all your heart and all your soul and all your mind.
- Love your neighbor as yourself.

These individuals—ordinary believers just like you and me—knew that with faith, nothing was impossible. Those men and women left us the LEGACY of St. Peter's Episcopal Church, a unique, loving, and vibrant faith community.

I was 10 years old, a fourth grader at Jamestown Elementary School, when my family stepped out in faith to be part of this church's founding. Virtually every important event in my faith journey has happened in this place:

- I was confirmed here
- I attended church school and youth group here, where I met and fell in love with Steve Kuhn
- I was married to Steve Kuhn here
- I grew spiritually as a young adult here by participating in a wonderful group known as "The Friends of St. Peter's"
- Our two daughters were baptized here
- I learned the importance of personal discipleship here as a Vestry member (twice) and as a Sunday School teacher
- I was supported here at times when my family was ravaged by horrific illnesses
- I was loved profoundly here when I lost my parents, my in-laws, and even my husband, and all of their ashes reside in the pine grove just behind me.
- I reaffirmed my baptismal vows and recommitted myself to Jesus Christ here
- I fell in love here a second time to Mike Leamon, who I first met here years earlier when we served together on the Vestry
- I was married to Mike here, and
- This summer, my eldest daughter will be married here.

NEW LEGACY CAMPAIGN (CONT.) —

Through all of these experiences, my faith in Jesus Christ has been challenged and strengthened. I would not be the woman I am today without the support of this community and this place.

St. Peter's has made a profound difference in my life.

And I suspect it has made a profound difference in your lives as well, whether you have been a part of this community for five decades, five years, five months, five weeks, or even five days. **Your presence here tonight is testimony to that fact.**

Each week, our campaign steering committee begins its meetings with individual testimonies about how our members came to be part of this community and how it has changed their lives. Their individual stories are different but their themes are the same.

They have said this about their experience at St. Peter's:

- I felt at home
- I was welcomed
- I was invited to do more
- I said yes
- And in that action, the Holy Spirit has transformed me and I have been profoundly changed.

Tonight we begin our New Legacy Campaign with the belief that the Holy Spirit is in the midst of this place and the faith that each one of us will say "YES."

We all know what St. Peter's is; tonight, I am asking you to imagine what it might become. I am asking you to consider how you and I can leave our NEW LEGACY. We are not just renovating a building; we are creating sacred space so that we can expand God's work of ministry. Although our plans are still conceptual, these are the needs our campaign is intended to address:

- A more clearly identified entrance and expanded narthex to improve our ability to welcome members and guests and provide adequate space to linger between services
- An expanded worship space to allow more seating
- A dedicated parish hall and upgraded kitchen to provide fellowship space for a range of expanded programming without impinging on our worship activities
- An expanded church school area to better serve our youngest members and their families
- Expanded meeting space to better accommodate the ministry work of our many committees and commissions
- Adequate office space for our clergy and support staff, who do so much to serve each one of us
- Improved facilities to support our dynamic music program
- Modernizations of bathrooms and installation of elevators to meet the needs of individuals with physical limitations.

St. Peter's is a wonderful community of faith where we are loved and supported in our spiritual journeys. **But we can do more.** It is time for us to step out in faith.

Through this campaign, we are asked to give prayerful consideration to making a stretch through sacrificial giving. This is the way our founders left their legacy, and this is the way we will leave ours.

As you and I consider how we might be part of the New Legacy, I suggest we turn again to Scripture, this time from the Book of Hebrews:

Therefore, since we are surrounded by such a great cloud of witnesses, let us throw off everything that hinders and the sin that so easily entangles. And let us run with perseverance the race marked out for us, fixing our eyes on Jesus, the pioneer and perfecter of faith.

Hebrews 12: 1-2

The cloud of witness has gone before us and yet is still all around us; we can throw off whatever is holding us back and run this race, knowing that the finish line is the glorification of God's kingdom.

All we need is the faith of a mustard seed.
