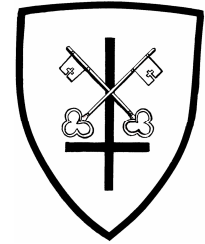
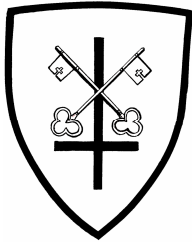

FROM THE ASSISTANT RECTOR

DATES TO NOTE:

Dear Friends,

I have been thinking a lot about time lately, mostly the lack thereof. I've been looking at my house and wondering how it ever got so messy. Then I begin wondering where I am ever going to find the time to really go through things and clean things up. And if I open a certain closet...I don't even want to go there! We are told to put things on our calendar if we want them to happen, so I do. If I want to make sure I exercise, it goes on the calendar. Bill-paying goes on the calendar. Of course, my appointments at work go there. My calendar seems to be telling me to hurry. If I could finish one thing more quickly than I have scheduled, then I could fit another thing in. There always seems to be stuff waiting in the wings to move onto my calendar...to reach a high enough priority to be finally written down, waiting to be done. One could almost get through the day not thinking, just marching from one thing on the calendar to the next. Don't we all wish we had more time?

Marching to time, or hurrying because of the lack of time, seems to control our lives. We have one word for time in English. Other languages have different words to describe different kinds of time. There is more than one word for time in French and Spanish. The Greeks also have several words for time, including *chronos* and *kairos*. *Chronos* describes time that can be

measured—the time on a clock, the appointments on our calendars or BlackBerries or iPhones. *Kairos* is God's time, living in the moment in such a way that we forget time. Madeleine L'Engle describes *kairos* in this way: "That time which breaks through *chronos* with a shock of joy, that time we do not recognize while we are experiencing it, but only afterwards, because *kairos* has nothing to do with chronological time. In *kairos* we are completely unselfconscious, and yet paradoxically far more real than we can ever be when we're constantly checking our watches for chronological time."

The most precious moments happen in God's time: a hummingbird feeding a few feet from my window; a mother bird feeding her young; the joy of watching a ballet or a play or listening to a concert and not realizing how much time has gone by; sitting by the ocean watching the waves; a precious conversation with a child...a conversation that occurs spontaneously and most certainly is not on your calendar. Spending time with the child, as much time as it takes, is experiencing *kairos*—time with your loved ones, time enjoying God's creation, an unscheduled hour that simply unfolds. All the things we long for and that mean the most to us take place during *kairos*.

The ironic thing is that although we cannot plan or schedule *kairos* we can

squeeze it out. We can be so busy that God cannot get in. God can try to get our attention and we brush God off because we are too busy or we are thinking about the next thing to get done or wondering how we are going to do all we have planned. If we just breathe, take a breath in our bodies and allow a breath in our lives, then *kairos* will happen.

Sarah Ban Breathnach eloquently expresses her thoughts about time in this way: “*Chronos* is clocks, deadlines, watches, calendars, agendas, planners, schedules, beepers. *Chronos* is time at her worst. *Chronos* keeps track. ...*Chronos* is the world’s time. *Kairos* is transcendence, infinity, reverence, joy, passion, love, the Sacred. *Kairos* is intimacy with the Real. *Kairos* is time at her best.... *Kairos* is Spirit’s time. We exist in *chronos*. We long for *kairos*. That’s our duality. *Chronos* requires speed so that it won’t be wasted. *Kairos* requires space so that it might be

savored. We do in *chronos*. In *kairos* we’re allowed to be...It takes only a moment to cross over from *chronos* into *kairos*, but it does take a moment. All that *kairos* asks is our willingness to stop running long enough to hear the music of the spheres.”

I wish more *kairos* for us all. My prayer this month is that we can all breathe, relax our schedules, and allow God room to move in our lives. We will be blessed, and perhaps surprised, by what unfolds.

MESSAGE FROM THE SENIOR WARDEN

The following is taken from a press release I prepared, with great assistance from Anna Fernau. It recognizes a moment of great celebration in our parish life.

It has become a tradition of sorts for a group of bicycling parishioners from St. Peter’s to pedal from church to the site of our parish retreat, Shrine Mont, in Orkney Springs, Virginia. The route is 135 miles up and down some pretty strenuous terrain. The cyclists’ entrance into the Shrine Mont facility is always cause for great celebration by the parish, but this year it was a particularly enthusiastic welcome. The 10 pedalers—Eric S., Rob G., Bill M., Peter M., Gary G., Doug M., Don W., Colin P., Sharon L., and Paul S., supported by Catharine and Neil G. in the SAG wagon—raised \$14,045 to assist in the building of a foster home in Masiphumelele, South Africa.

St. Peter’s has teamed up with the St. Francis Outreach Trust, of Cape Town, to sponsor Homes to Grow. The houses constructed will be private dwellings that will provide a home to six children who have been orphaned or abandoned as a result of their parents dying from HIV/AIDS. A foster mother will be carefully selected to live with the children in the homes that will be in the local community.

South Africa has the highest number of people infected by HIV in the world. It is also one of the most economically unequal societies in the world. This year, a total of 2 million children in South Africa will have been orphaned by this epidemic. The Anglican Church in South Africa is responding to this crisis by building foster homes for this generation of orphaned children. We are also responding to the call.

To date, St. Peter’s has raised \$25,000, which is half of what is needed to build the home. With the fund-raising of the Pedalers realized in part by a generous matching pledge of a parishioner, it will now be possible to get the roof installed on the building before the rains begin in July. It is truly a cause for celebration that our parish has responded in this amazing fashion to our mission work. And the opportunities will continue!

MISSION COMMISSION NEWS

The month of June will offer a few more opportunities to "let your light shine." A car wash on Father's Day (June 20) will be a fundraiser for our mission trip to South Africa in 2011. Organized by Thad K., the car wash will raise money for those who might need financial assistance to make the trip. The more the merrier, so if you can be there to wash cars let Thad know. To learn more about the South Africa mission project please attend the Adult Forum on June 13.

On each of the four Sundays in June we will be collecting toiletries and "walking food" for men in honor of Father's Day. The toiletries and food will be donated to the Samaritan Ministry for Greater Washington (SMGW) for their clients. Please place your donations in the aluminum washtub in the narthex (lists of supplies needed are in the narthex, too).

In June and throughout the summer please continue to sign up to volunteer for Meals-On-Wheels, So Others Might Eat and Arlington Food Assistance Center. Helping hands are always needed, especially during summer vacation season.

May was a good month for mission at St. Peter's. Our very generous parishioners donated many items for our annual toiletries and walking food drive for the women clients of SMGW, in honor of Mother's Day.

The Adult Forum on May 16 focused on the Triangle of Hope micro-credit project in Ghana. We donated \$1,300 last year to the project. In all, the project started with about \$5,000 and has loaned this money out in small blocks of a few hundred dollars to very poor families to underwrite purchases of inventory or other goods to sell at a small profit. Anglican churches in the town of Kumasi participate in organizing the micro-credit project.

COMMISSION NEWS (CONT.) —

Ghana is a small state in western Africa a little over twice the size of Virginia and with roughly three times as many people. Its economy relies mostly on agriculture and mining. Farming communities occupied the geographic region of Ghana from about 1500 B.C.E. Mining started soon after. Portuguese, Dutch, Danish and English traders arrived from 1482 C.E. onward and by the 18th century the political power in the area rested with Europeans. Ghana became an English colony in the 19th century until after World War II, when the de-colonization era began. Ghana became completely independent again in 1957.

VESTRY NEWS —

Vestry Highlights May 18, 2010

At its May meeting, St. Peter's vestry:

- Heard Rector the Rev. Craig Phillips report that St. Peter's has hired Elyse Gustafson as Assistant Rector to fill the position vacated by the Rev. Mary Demmler. Ms. Gustafson is a graduate of Duke Divinity School. Because of a moratorium on ordinations in her home diocese of Chicago, she will not be ordained when she joins St. Peter's in September.
- Heard a report from the Building Committee on its plan for the first year of a plan to add to or renovate St. Peter's buildings. The vestry approved the Planning Committee's request to search for and hire an architectural firm to support the parish's needs.
- Approved a list of adjustments to the 2010 budget.

Adult Forum

Adult Forum sessions on Sundays at 10 a.m. are designed to serve our community by stimulating our thinking and actions in the Christian faith, exploring timely issues in our church and the world, and as an occasion for discussion about the ongoing activities in missions, worship, education and stewardship at St. Peter's. Topics range from aspects of our faith and worship, to books of the Bible, figures in Christian history, ethical dilemmas and contemporary issues of interest to our community. Discussion leaders come from within our parish community or sometimes are specially invited outside guest speakers, and we try to have two forums to choose from each Sunday. Please contact Jonathan Sullivan with ideas or feedback or to volunteer to lead a discussion.

June 6—Second Sunday after Pentecost

Option I: The Britten War Requiem—Led by Peter M.

"What passing bells for these who die as cattle?" Benjamin Britten combined the requiem mass and poems written by a British soldier killed in World War I into his *War Requiem*, commissioned for the 1962 reconsecration of Coventry Cathedral after the original structure was destroyed during World War II. Listening to the *War Requiem* can help us reflect on war, God's grace, and reconciliation.

Does the punishment fit the crime? There appears to be a dichotomy between the seemingly harsh punishments for petty crime versus lighter treatment of white-collar crime. Biblical concepts of justice in both the Old and New testaments will be discussed. All are welcome and we especially invite the St. Peter's legal community for their input. St. Peter's parishioner Mary L. is Professor of Forensic Psychology at Marymount University and a frequent expert witness at court cases in the D.C. area.

WILLS AND ESTATE PLANNING DISCUSSION: FORUM AND LUNCHEON PROGRAMS JUNE 27

Mark your calendars for Sunday, June 27, when the St. Peter's Generation-to-Generation Fund Trustees will host two programs on wills awareness and end-of-life matters.

Paul L of the Arlington law firm of firm of Manning Murray will lead a discussion on the need for a will during our 10 a.m. adult forum and return after our 11 a.m. service for a luncheon program and more detailed presentation about end-of-life planning matters including long-term care, medical directives, organ donations, charitable gift annuities, and funeral directions.

According to the Episcopal Church Foundation, seven out of ten Episcopalians have not prepared a will. If you intend to provide for loved ones as well as charitable institutions that you will leave behind, you should be taking steps to document those wishes.

A graduate of Boston College and Georgetown University Law Center, Paul is a longtime member of the Trust and Estate sections of the American Bar Association, the Virginia State Bar, and the Arlington Bar Association.

The St. Peter's Generation-to-Generation Fund was created by the Vestry in 2002 to facilitate legacy giving to our parish. Information about the Fund will be available at both programs.

MUSIC AT ST. PETER'S —

Shall We Gather at the River?

1864

And he showed me a pure river of water of life, clear as crystal, proceeding from the throne of God and of the Lamb.

Revelation 22:1

Often called the "Good Doctor," Robert Lowry was a cheerful man with a big beard and a quick mind. He pastured Baptist churches in the Eastern U.S. during the mid-1800s. One friend said, "Very few men had greater ability in painting pictures from imagination. He could thrill an audience with his vivid descriptions, inspiring them with the same thoughts that inspired him."

MUSIC AT ST. PETER'S (CONT.) —

But he is best remembered for his hymns. Even in childhood Lowry had composed tunes, and as he became acquainted with leaders in America hymnology—many of them based in New York—he realized he could reach more people through his songs than through his sermons.

He set many of Fanny Crosby's hymns to music, including the classic *All the Way My Savior Leads Me*. And he wrote both words and music to the popular gospel song *Nothing but the Blood*: "What can wash away my sins?/Nothing but the blood of Jesus."

The doctor's best known hymn is *Shall We Gather at the River?* Though often used at baptisms, it's actually a song about heaven. It came to Lowry on a midsummer's day in New York, when, in sweltering heat, he began musing about the cool, crystal river that flows through the city of God as described in Revelation 22:

One afternoon in July 1864, when I was pastor at Hanson Place Baptist Church, Brooklyn, the weather was oppressively hot, and I was lying on a lounge in a state of physical exhaustion. I felt almost incapable of bodily exertion, and my imagination began to take itself wings, visions of the future passed before me in startling vividness. The imagery of the apocalypse took the form of a tableau. Brightest of all were the throne, the heavenly river, and the gathering of the saints. My soul seemed to take new life from that celestial outlook. I began to wonder why the hymn writers had said so much about the "river of death" and so little about the "pure water of life, clear as crystal, proceeding out of the throne of God and the Lamb." As I mused, the words began to construct themselves. They came first as a question of Christian inquiry, "Shall we gather?" Then they broke out in a chorus, "Yes, we'll gather." On this question and answer the hymn developed itself. The music came with the hymn.
