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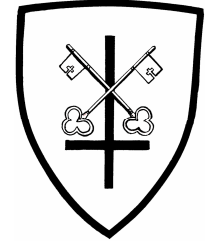
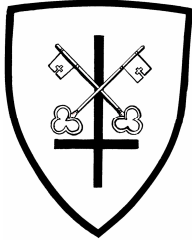

FROM THE ASSISTANT RECTOR

Giving Thanks and Thanksgiving

My family has a tradition every Thanksgiving of going around the table after our bellies are full of turkey and dressing (and Mom's sweet potato soufflé!) and each member of the family sharing what he or she is thankful for in the past year. Sometimes the things people share are expected (a new baby, marriage, or job) and sometimes they are unexpected (a moment the rest of us had forgotten that stuck with one member of the family member). I remember some years being a little annoyed that we had to undergo this ritual but most years I enjoy the time of sharing tremendously.

While Thanksgiving is a national holiday and not a church feast day, I am glad that we have a prescribed time in our national life to stop and give thanks for all that we have as a country. Unfortunately, it seems Thanksgiving is beginning to get a little lost between Halloween and Christmas and, for many, is known as the great shopping opportunity—although likely a little less so this year.

We know that we are to give thanks to the Lord always and lift up our prayers of thanksgiving to God for all we have. October saw the kickoff of our pledge campaign in the church, a time when we as Christians pledge to return thanks to God through our monetary gifts to the church. This is not a matter of budgetary housekeeping on the part of the church, but rather is a spiritual exercise on the part of the parishioner. A time to consider the many blessings God has bestowed upon you and what an

appropriate response to that might be.

But what about thanksgivings in the rest of your life? How often do you not only give thanks to God for the people in your life, but also turn and thank them for all they do? Do you act on the lessons from your youth and say "please" and "thank you" as often as you should? I am somewhat dismayed by the lack of gratitude in our society, and by how surprised and embarrassed people become when you thank them—especially for small things.

Returning thanks to God is a key element in our relationship with God and in our faith journey. But it cannot stop at submitting a pledge card and raising up prayers of thanksgiving. We serve God by serving one another, and reach out to Christ by reaching out to the Spirit that is within each and every one of us. Giving thanks to God also entails giving thanks to one another and not taking the other for granted.

For as much as we like to think of ourselves as independent and self-sufficient, the truth is that humans are creatures of community and we rely on one another.

And the best way to remind ourselves of that interdependence on a daily basis is through the simple act of saying "thank you." Consider thanking your spouse for the chores he or she does without being asked. Thank your friends for their openness and love. Stop a police officer, soldier, or firefighter on the street and thank them for serving our community.

MESSAGE FROM THE SENIOR WARDEN —

GODLY PLAY OFF TO A GOOD START

In September, we began the third year of Godly Play and have about 25 children participating each week. Godly Play is an approach to children's spiritual formation that is based on creating a sacred space in which to present the stories of our faith and wonder about them together. The approach is based on the Montessori Method of learning, and was developed by Jerome Berryman. Godly Play is offered during the first half of the 9:00 service every Sunday except the first Sunday of the month, when a Children's Sermon is provided. It runs from September through early June, encompassing about 26 Sundays. We provide Godly Play through three classes: 3- & 4-year-olds, 5-year-olds & Kindergarteners, and First Graders. We have 20+ adults who have been trained in Godly Play—seven are needed to staff each Sunday. In early October, we sponsored a one-day training session for new and continuing adult workers for the program and were fortunate to again have as our trainer Becki Stewart, who was trained by Jerome Berryman. SUNDAY SCHOOL UPDATE

Have you heard all the moving around? Well, due to good growth, we have been playing musical rooms for the start of Sunday School. For the 2009–2010 school year, we have more than 110 students enrolled and more than 35 adults engaged in teaching and supporting the Sunday School. Our classes are Pre-K, Age 5, Grade 1, Grade 2, Grades 3&4, Grades 5&6 and Grades 7&8. We have been blessed with increased enrollment, energetic and talented teachers, and parish support.

If you know of a family or child who needs encouraging to join Sunday School, please reach out to them, or let the Rev. Ann Martens know so we can coordinate encouragement.

We have cultivated an excellent and supportive environment for our young families through our Sunday School program. Our teachers are dedicated to their students and share in their classrooms the family feeling that is also felt throughout the parish membership. We are blessed in many ways.

We introduced a new learning curriculum, "I Am Rock Solid" (www.iamrocksolid.com), this year for the lower grades, which is going well.

The pageant is scheduled for December 13 during the 9 a.m. service. Jennifer Weaver is again lending her talents to lead the pageant. Since we have more children, there is an effort underway to make more costumes! Please let Jennifer W. know if you are interested in assisting.

We are also planning for an intergenerational Lenten program—Willy Wonka and the Chocolate Factory is the theme. Can you guess who is going to be Willy Wonka???? Initials are DW and he plays the trumpet.

STEWARDSHIP LETTER FROM THE RECTOR

“Stewardship” is a word that seems to strike fear into the hearts of many Episcopalians. Because we use the word most often in the fall when churches begin their annual pledge campaigns, we tend to associate the term exclusively with fundraising. That is a shame because stewardship is so much more; it is something that you and I practice each and every day of our lives. At St. Peter’s, we emphasize the idea of “proportional giving.” That is, we recognize that what we give is in proportion to all that we have.

Every day of my life I am a steward of what God has given me. Every day I have to decide how I will spend my money, how I will use my time, and how I will use the abilities and talents that God has given me. All of these decisions are part of my stewardship of the life that God has given me.

When I recognize that all that I am and all that I have comes from God, my perspective on how I should live my life changes. This life-changing realization can open our lives to a richer spirituality than we ever thought possible. In the same way that proper exercise changes the body, making it healthier, giving changes the giver, strengthening and focusing us on the community of the church and on the work of God’s people.


In the scriptures there is an explicit understanding that in the stewardship of our time, talents, and treasures there is a portion for us to use and enjoy and a portion that rightly belongs to God. In the Old Testament it was understood that 10% of each person’s wealth belonged to God and the community of God’s people. The tithe was a way to recognize that what we have is not ours alone but rather that everything we have ultimately belongs to God. The fact that everyone contributed proportionately to their religious community brought the people together into a closer fellowship with one another. When the scriptures talk about giving, it is always about proportional giving.

Even if you do not feel that you are ready to tithe, you ought to look carefully at the proportion of what you give to the community of God’s people in relation to all that you earn. How does the amount you give reflect your priorities and commitments to God? Is it possible for you to stretch and give a bit more? Always remember that whatever you give, your gift should not be given grudgingly but rather as a joyful response to all that God has given you.

Our lives are full of choices, choices that ultimately are about our own stewardship of the life that God has given us. The money, talents, and abilities you have been given are not given to you for your sole use and possession. You are called by God to share your treasures within the community of the church so that together all God’s people will flourish together.

I know that each and every one of us has a responsibility to contribute to our common life together at St. Peter’s. There are many opportunities for giving, ministry, service, and fellowship. The community of St. Peter’s is made stronger by the contributions you make.

I pray this year that each of you will work and pray to discern how you can best offer your treasures, time, and talents to God and to the people of God. Large and small, the gifts that you give enrich the soul of St. Peter’s.

VESTRY NEWS —

Vestry Highlights October 20, 2009

At the vestry's October 20, 2009 meeting, the vestry:

- Heard a report from the Stewardship Committee that St. Peter's had received \$423,230 in pledges as of October 20. Committee chair Lisa L. reported that, while a few pledges had fallen from the previous year, many had increased.
- Recognized the start of a new committee within the Worship Commission to focus on the role of the arts in worship and personal religion.
- Heard from assistant rector the Rev. Ann Martens that St. Peter's needs about 30 volunteers for a multi-generational Lenten program based on *Willy Wonka and the Chocolate Factory*. The 2007 program based on the Harry Potter books was a great success.
- Discussed the next steps St. Peter's should take on its path toward a capital improvement campaign. After receiving input from the current Planning Team, the vestry plans to appoint a new Building Committee to keep this year's momentum rolling.
- Heard from the Mission Commission of parish member Anna F.'s efforts to join with St. Francis Anglican church in Simonton, South Africa, in founding and sponsoring housing for orphans with HIV infections. The commission plans this effort to include a family mission trip to the Capetown area in 2011.
- Issued a call for a parishioner to coordinate the updating of the new parish Web site. The volunteer task would involve working with our Web hosting company, designer, parish administrator and parishioners.
- Approved the posting of a booklet for use by families in arranging and planning funerals at St. Peter's. This booklet joins a similar booklet for weddings.
- Directed the Personnel Committee to advertise for a new part-time bookkeeper position and approved a position description for the job.
