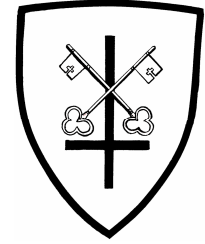
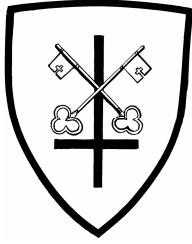

FROM THE ASSISTANT RECTOR

DATES TO NOTE:

Dear Friends,

Mary and I recently attended the Diocese of Virginia Clergy Conference at Shrine Mont. One of the speakers talked about obtaining balance in your life. She did not talk about the usual—make time for family, exercise, etc. Instead she spoke about bringing more gratitude into your life, and that, by doing so, you will find you have more balance.

I have been thinking a lot about gratitude since that day. I must admit that I've fallen a bit astray in the gratitude department lately. It is so easy just to ask God for what we need, and by focusing on what we lack in our prayers, we tend to focus more on what we lack in our day-to-day lives. On the contrary, focusing on what we are thankful for can give us a more positive outlook in general.

In pondering gratitude, I recalled that I used to do a lot better job of giving thanks. When I was in the Air Force at the Pentagon, I rode the Metro to work. I walked four or five blocks to the Metro station and I would pray daily on my way to work. I established the routine of giving thanks to God for my entire walk to the Metro. This proved to be an interesting exercise because

after I gave the usual thanks for things that popped quickly into my head (e.g., health, family, friends, my cat) I would find I still had several more blocks to go. Then I had to start to think! As I continued to walk and think I found I discovered so many things I was thankful for. As the days went by and I continued my exercise, a funny thing occurred. Instead of running out of things to say with blocks still to go, I found I would arrive at the Metro and not be through with my list of things to be thankful for! As the weeks went by, an interesting thing started to happen. While I still hated working in the Pentagon, I found I had a cheerier outlook overall. I began to find the good in things more quickly. I found I was more patient with folks. Little irritants did not get under my skin so easily. I could laugh off things that used to bother me. I became calmer and more easygoing. Most importantly, my life felt abundant.

I stopped my practice when I stopped riding the Metro to work. However, I lost something important when I did. So I've started a gratitude practice again and I'm waiting for it to make the same difference in my life that it did before.

MESSAGE FROM THE SENIOR WARDEN —

Last month the Vestry considered and set aside a proposal to make the church parking lot available to Marymount University during their current construction project. In the process, I learned quite a bit about stewardship.

The proposal was to allow Marymount's construction workers to leave their cars at St. Peter's on weekdays when our parking lot would otherwise be mostly empty. In return, the construction company would make a donation to St. Peter's that would just about close the gap in the church's 2009 budget. Initially this seemed like a good idea. Other churches in the area have ongoing arrangements with Marymount to allow students to park and be shuttled to campus, and St. Peter's has provided overflow parking for Marymount special events in the past. And, of course, the thought of resolving the budget gap painlessly was certainly appealing. In the end, however, the benefit to Marymount and the revenue from the construction company were not enough to outweigh the disruption to our more immediate neighbors and the possibility of conflict with our own renovation plans should Marymount's project be delayed.

In the vestry's discussions, someone raised the point that our Vision Statement identifies "being more intentional stewards" and "nurtur[ing] all we have been given" as part of God's call to us as a parish. Good stewardship is making good use of whatever God has placed in our care. As a parish we are stewards of our church building and grounds. Our Building and Grounds Committee wrestles regularly with how to make good use of these gifts. As you are probably aware, they and their building planning sub-group are currently seeking input from all of us on renovations and improvements to the building. Consensus is growing that to make good use of it we need to provide more space for the Sunday School, the choir, and Coffee Hour, improve the bathrooms, and make it handicap-accessible.

Our grounds are used to a considerable extent as neighborhood parkland. Their natural beauty is available to us through the sanctuary windows and provides both solace in the Memorial Garden and occasion for glee on the playground. Through the discussion of the parking lot deal I learned that while parking cars on it seems like a good use of a parking lot, renting it out for 18 months to close a one-year budget gap while generating ill will among our neighbors and possibly inconveniencing our own construction plans is perhaps a not-so-good use.

Another stewardship issue that the parking lot proposal reveals is that of finding ourselves trying to chase down revenue that in the ordinary course of events should be coming from parishioners' pledges—our individual stewardship of our money. It currently costs not quite \$1 million a year to run St. Peter's—to pay the clergy and staff and run the office (\$600,000); to keep the lights on and the rain off (\$125,000); to equip ourselves to worship, have fellowship, and serve one another (\$55,000); and to support and serve the broader church and community (\$125,000). Special activities like the play and the parish retreats generally cover their own costs. All of this money comes directly from us—from those of us who "belong" to St. Peter's by attending on Sundays and being part of our community.

The parish budget works out to about \$3500 per household. Clearly some of us have deeper or shallower pockets than the average, and membership in the church is not something one purchases with money alone. But money is important to the church and it comes from each of us cheerfully pledging a portion of the abundance God has entrusted to us. That's good stewardship.

MISSION NEWS —

May was a very busy month for St. Peter's mission activities. In honor of Mother's Day, we collected food and toiletries for women. These were donated to the Samaritan Ministry of Greater Washington, which serves the homeless population in the area. SMGW has offices in Washington, D.C., and Arlington.

On May 2, we held our exciting Fiesta fundraiser for the mission trip to the Dominican Republic. The St. Peter's missionaries are: Libby C. (trip leader), Stephanie H., Hailey J., Katie R., Glenn M., Joy L. and Leonardo H.. We had hoped we would also be able to take missionaries from another Arlington parish, but that proved to be not logistically possible.

On Mother's Day we held a fundraiser car wash. Our parishioners were extremely generous in their donations to help the mission trip in return for getting their cars washed! They were generous even when they didn't have their cars washed! Another car wash will be held in June on Father's Day (June 21—also the parish picnic day).

Our missionaries will be sent on July 12 and they will return July 20. They will return to the villages of Montellano and Mosovi in the Dominican Republic to help with constructing the second story of the school that last year's mission team worked on. Libby C. participated in that trip and felt called to lead the trip this year. In addition to construction work (taking place in the morning hours) our group will also lead vacation Bible school for the children in the afternoons.

Looking forward to the months to come, please join in the regular activities that always need help—especially in the summer months when vacation season is in full swing (SOME, Meals on Wheels, AFAC). Sign-up sheets are in the Narthex. Also, please anticipate a drive for housewares (save those Bed Bath & Beyond coupons!). We will provide the housewares for an apartment to be furnished by Transitional Housing Corporation (an offshoot of SMGW). This drive will be happening in August and September.

ARLINGTON FOOD ASSISTANCE CENTER

The Arlington Food Assistance Center (AFAC) continues to experience an increase in food demand over previous years. In the week ending May 9, 1117 families were fed by AFAC. In the same period in 2008, 857 families received food, and in 2007, 692 families. Here is how it works: only residents of Arlington can qualify to receive food from AFAC, and each must be referred by a recognized institution such as the staff nurses of Arlington Public Schools, or the county's Crisis Intake Center. According to AFAC there is little or no abuse of this process. The clients are overwhelmingly the "working poor" of Arlington County, but also include the elderly, disabled and refugees. There is a particular demand right now for cereals and any type of canned protein, including meats and peanut butter. Please consider AFAC in your giving plans, and don't forget to bring your extra non-perishable food to the church.

VESTRY NEWS —**Vestry Highlights April 28, 2009****At its April meeting, the St. Peter's Vestry:**

Authorized exploration of a Building Fund. Parishioners Larry S. and Frank B. urged the vestry to create a Building Fund to serve as the basis for building expansion. There were not sufficient details for a final decision, so the vestry authorized the Planning Team to develop a proposal for consideration in the fall.

Heard that St. Peter's will begin a search for a new treasurer. Mira Brown has agreed to stay on as parish treasurer until the church can find a replacement.

Learned that Margaret C. has agreed to stay on for an additional year as St. Peter's very successful Sunday School coordinator.

Approved request for Third Thursday Luncheon Funding. The vestry approved a request by Assistant Rector the Rev. Mary Demmler to request a grant from the Generation-to-Generation Fund to support the new Third Thursday Luncheon group for senior members of the parish.

Agreed on donation to support St. Peter's new seminarian, Laura D. The vestry voted to donate the May 31 loose plate collection to fund St. Peter's pledge of support for Laura Doud's candidacy for Holy Orders at Virginia Theological Seminary.

Approved ordination gift for Mary Thorpe. The vestry approved the purchase of a traveling communion kit as a gift for St. Peter's Mary T. at her ordination on June 6, 2009.

Discussed an old-fashioned church fair to replace the bazaar, which the vestry cancelled in 2008. One suggestion was for the various church committees and commissions to sponsor booths or activities. Kathi A. agreed to serve as co-chair with a younger member.

Agreed on replenishment of the Clergy Discretionary Fund. The vestry designated May 3 as the date to donate the loose plate offering to replenish the Clergy Discretionary Fund, which is almost depleted due to the difficult economic times.

Vestry Highlights May 18, 2009**At its May meeting, the St. Peter's Vestry:**

Discussed relations with the neighbors in the wake of the vestry's decision to cancel the parking lot rental agreement. The Building and Grounds Committee will consider some physical changes to the grounds. The Finance Committee and the vestry as a whole will have to deal with a budget that will be in deficit without the projected \$1800 monthly donation.

Heard a plea to reinstate St. Peter's grounds upkeep days as parish events. Attendance and enthusiasm for grounds cleanup and planting days has fallen off, and the vestry discussed reemphasizing it as fellowship as well as work.

Agreed in principle to set up a Gift Review Committee within the vestry. Formal details and processes will be presented later for a vote.

Voted to move ahead with the purchase of a third octave of handbells, using a directed gift.

Agreed on funding for the spring Third Tuesday Luncheons by releasing about \$600 in funds from the Young Adults and Fellowship budget lines.
