### FROM THE ASSISTANT RECTOR

### DATES TO NOTE:

"Summertime...and the livin' is easy..." I often think of those Gershwin lyrics this time of year. I wish those lyrics were true, but summer seems to fly by for me, as busy as ever. Starting in April, I begin adding things to my summer to-do list—when I'll have so much free time! Ha! Of course, most are still on the list when September rolls around. I have talked to some of the youth and children of the parish about things they are doing this summer and some of them are so busy I get tired just listening to their schedules. Lacrosse camp *and* soccer camp *and* band camp *and* swim team *and* two weeks at sleep-away camp. I wonder if these children's parents' schedules are equally as busy. How about when you go on vacation? Are you doing something every minute? Do you need a vacation once you return from your vacation?

In the evenings I pray using a book called *Celtic Daily Prayer: Prayers and Readings from the Northumbria Community*. One of the readings at the beginning of the summer was the following:

Once Abbot Antony was conversing with some brethren, and a hunter who was after game in the wilderness came upon them. He saw Abbot Antony and the brothers enjoying themselves and disapproved. Abbot Antony said, "Put an arrow in your bow and shoot it." This he did. "Now shoot another," said the Elder. "And another...another...and another..."

Then the hunter replied, "If I bend my bow all the time it will break." Abbot Antony replied, "So it is with the work of God. If we push ourselves beyond measure, the brethren will soon collapse. It is right therefore, from time to time, to relax."

Our busy lives don't leave much time to relax. Relaxing means collapsing in a chair late at night. When was the last time you scheduled nothing and did whatever you felt like doing instead? When was the last time you quit worrying about being productive? Most of us are just too busy and too overscheduled to allow for this unplanned time. We need to rest from our busyness for our creative juices to kick in. Without even thinking about it, in the rest, a solution to a problem that has long stymied us may appear. We may come up with an idea of something we'd like to do or like to try. We may find we enjoy things like cooking or creating something new: a new game, a scrapbook, a family tree, a garden. We may find we learn something from our children we didn't know. We may find we laugh more...and sleep better. In fact, these unscheduled periods of time may wind up being our most productive!

Ironically, for me to have any unscheduled time at all, I find I have to schedule it. Sad, isn't it, the need to write "unscheduled" on my calendar! But I do. And I stop what I'm doing,

life. The school year, with its demands and schedules, will be here before we know it. Summer can be a time to rest. It’s not being lazy. It is necessary for our physical, mental and spiritual health. Without it, we will break, just like the hunter’s bow.

## MESSAGE FROM THE SENIOR WARDEN

As we move rapidly toward the end of the summer vacation season, I am happy to report that our building program continues full speed ahead.

This spring, about 220 St. Peter’s parishioners pledged a total of approximately \$3,000,000 to our New Legacy Campaign, or 75% of our ultimate goal. The next time you see our co-chairs, Tootie K and Peter M, or any of the other members of our New Legacy Campaign, please thank them for their hard work and dedication and congratulate them for a job well done!

In June 2011, St. Peter’s Trustees, the New Legacy Campaign Committee and representatives of the Finance Committee met to review the progress of the New Legacy Campaign and to discuss the next steps for moving forward with our building program. All three groups unanimously endorsed moving forward with the next logical step in the building program—creation of the schematic design for the new/renovated building. The expectation is that the schematic design will enable us to solicit bids from construction companies and to develop a detailed cost estimate for the project.

At its June meeting, the Vestry authorized the Rector and Tony P, chair of our Building Committee, to form a Phase 2 Building Committee to oversee the design and construction phases of the building program. The Vestry also authorized the Rector and the Phase 2 Building Committee to engage with the architects Cox, Graae & Spack to develop the schematic design for our new/renovated building.

Stay tuned for additional updates as the Building Committee, working with the architects, develops the schematic design for our new church home.

### SEPTEMBER 11 ADULT FORUM

September 11 this year marks the tenth anniversary of the al Qaeda attack on the World Trade Center. The Archbishop of Canterbury, Rowan Williams, was in New York City only a few hundred yards away from the twin towers on that day and he wrote a book reflecting on his experience.

On Sunday, September 11, at the Adult Forum we will discuss that book, *Writing in the Dust*, in which Williams outlines a faithful response to the horrific events of that day. If you are interested in reading this very brief book (think long magazine article length) ahead of time to make our discussion more meaningful, pick up a copy in the Narthex in August. Copies will also be available in the church office. A donation of \$4 per book is requested.

## STEWARDSHIP NEWS —

The Stewardship Committee met in July to plan for the fall's annual pledge campaign. We discussed various forms of electronic giving, dates and a timeline for the fall campaign, and a new format for sharing information about the parish's finances.

There are a number of different ways to make electronic giving to the church work, and there are different perceptions of what electronic giving might offer—automatic pledge withdrawal and “click-to-give” options are two examples. Costs for these services vary. We agreed to do some more research into what might be most valuable for St. Peter's.

For the fall campaign, we decided to solicit written testimonials about why parishioners give to the church. Why would you or anyone else give money to St. Peter's or any other church?

Another new aspect of this fall's campaign will be a narrative budget. A big step up from a simple pie chart, the narrative budget is a booklet that aims to show how St. Peter's budgeted funds support the mission and ministry of the parish. Copies will be distributed to St. Peter's households, along with a pledge card for 2012, in September.

## VESTRY NEWS —

### July 19 Vestry Meeting Highlights

- Catharine , Stewardship Sub-Committee Chair, briefed the Vestry about the plan for the 2012 Stewardship Campaign and how to answer the most common questions people ask about Stewardship.
- The Vestry discussed the pros and cons of accepting unsolicited, directed gifts, and then concluded that it should clarify its position on this matter for the parishioners.
- The Building and Grounds Committee reported that the two smaller signs for each side of the driveway had recently been installed and that parishioner feedback had been positive so far.
- The Vestry authorized the Building and Grounds Committee to spend up to \$7,000 to purchase the two large signs with the church name and two smaller ones with the church hours for use on Glebe Road.
- The Vestry authorized the Building and Grounds Committee to hire the most responsive bidder and spend up to \$16,000 to make interim parking lot repairs consistent with those recommended by parishioner and professional engineer Kevin G in his report to the Committee on the condition of the parking lot earlier this year.
- The Christian Formation Commission reported that the Adult Forum schedule for September–January was taking shape and thanked the Rector and Catharine G for their leadership in coming up with ideas for the curriculum.
- The Treasurer presented the Profit & Loss Budget Performance Report for June 2011. The report showed that the forecast YTD budget gap widened due to lower than expected pledge receipts in the month of June. The Treasurer attributed this to an early start to the usual slowdown in pledging over summer months.
- The Vestry passed a resolution regarding the Memorial Garden Fund which:
  - Established a permanent, dedicated Memorial Garden Fund where gifts for memorials, thanksgivings and celebrations can be made to fund the ongoing maintenance of, and future enhancements to, the Memorial Garden at St. Peter's.
  - Directed the Rector and the Building and Grounds Committee to establish a Memorial Garden Sub-Committee.
  - Directed that the Sub-Committee:
    - Draft a charter which sets out the terms for the management and operation of the Memorial Garden and the Memorial Garden Fund, and
    - Refer this Charter to the Building and Grounds Committee and the Vestry for its review and approval by September 20, 2011.

The next meeting of the Vestry will be on Tuesday September 20, 2011 at 7:00 p.m.

## SOUTH AFRICA MISSION —

### QUILTS OF LOVE

Last month, 27 members of St. Peter's Episcopal Church in Arlington set off on a journey to South Africa hand-carrying the message "we care, we love you" in the form of seven hand-sewn quilts to give to six AIDS orphans and their housemother at their new foster home in Masiphumelele, outside Cape Town, South Africa.

More than two million children in South Africa (44,000 in Cape Town alone) have been orphaned by AIDS. The Anglican Archbishop of Cape Town, Thabo Makgoba, has called on each parish with the means to help build and sustain a foster home for children orphaned by AIDS.

The Church of St. Francis of Assisi in Simon's Town, one of the oldest Anglican churches in South Africa, responded to their leader's call. "If these children are moved from the shanties where they now live to a loving home in the township where they come from, they will grow up without the stigma of being 'institution' children, and will be members of a loving family," declared Uwe Hass, former Chair of the St. Francis Outreach Trust.

Rear Admiral Robert , now chief of staff of the South African Navy, and his wife, Diana, were involved with the St. Francis Outreach Trust. They had been active members of St. Peter's when he served as the South African naval attaché in Washington, D.C., in the 1990s. When two parishioners of St. Peter's, Anna and Blair F, traveled to South Africa in 2009 with their children looking for an opportunity to work with AIDS orphans, they were introduced to the St. Francis Trust by the Higgs and a partnership was born. Since then, St. Peter's has worked closely with the St. Francis Outreach Trust, raising over \$50,000 to help purchase the land and build the first home for six children in Masiphumelele. In July, a St. Peter's mission team left for South Africa to work with the children and put the final touches on the home.

The idea—to make seven quilts—grew out of planning for the trip and considerations about what gift the parishioners could bring that would mean something to the children and also remind them of people far away who cared. What began as a simple idea—to leave a quilt for each child so they would know every night as they go to bed that they are loved—grew far more complex. Mission leader Anna asked around the parish whether anyone knew anything about quilting or if there was someone the church could hire to guide the project.

Former Vestry Junior Warden Gretchen responded to the call. She is a talented architect with a background in Interior Design. When she raised her hand at the meeting she thought she could use her knowledge of quilting to find an appropriate design pattern. After all, quilts are largely drawn from historic patterns.

Anna's directions were sparse: involve St. Peter's children to help make the quilts. Gretchen thought about how every night these children would be wrapped in a gift from St. Peter's and the love of God. There were no ready store-bought solutions.

It was a big message. How do you ask a child to describe love to someone they've never met? During Sunday School throughout the month of February, Gretchen and the teachers gathered the youth of St. Peter's, ages 4 to 18, and read a story with them about South Africa and children who'd lost their parents to AIDS. They talked about the story and she handed each a 3"x3.5" piece of paper, 120 in all, and asked them to illustrate "what love means to you" by drawing in pencil on the paper.

## **SOUTH AFRICA MISSION (CONT.) —**

To transfer the children's responses to cloth, Gretchen photocopied the paper drawings onto special fabric. She then took them back to the children and had them use colored fabric pens to bring the drawings to life. Now there were 120 "art squares" that would form the centers of each of the twenty quilted squares that would be stitched into six quilts. No two images are the same and all are used in the quilts.

Without a ready-made design, Gretchen used her skill as an architect to create the geometric pattern for the quilt. She and parishioner Vikkey then went to the Artful Quilter in Burke, Virginia, to find fabric. "Fabric is to a quilter what paint is to a painter," Gretchen said. After hours of searching they found a beautiful batik pattern with an African touch that formed the frame for each art square.

To make a quilt requires many hands. Over the next six months the quilters joined Gretchen at weekly gatherings. First they met at St. Peter's and later at her house. These gatherings included talented parishioners Vikkey, Melanie, Lauren, Diane, Kathryn, Polly, Betty, Dorcas, Kristin, Karen, Joan, Dorothea, and Lynn.

First they had to cut the fabric. The pieces were put into 120 separate baggies with one art square apiece. Gretchen gave the sewers two weeks to assemble these, following the pattern, before the group met again. The weekly meetings went from 6 p.m. until about 10. Gretchen never knew who would show up from week to week, but just like manna from heaven there were always enough talented people at each meeting. After the squares were assembled and sewn, the sewers prepared the batting and backing and began to put the twenty 4"x5" squares on the quilt. Care was taken to ensure the fabric was both fireproof and sophisticated so the children would be protected and the centerpiece art square set out smartly.

The weekly gatherings moved from the church to the Ginnerty house, where "quilting bees" were held in good Episcopal fashion with food and even a bit of wine available. Each art square had to be hand-sewn into the quilt around a small hoop. When the quilts were displayed at church on June 12, every original work of art was included—though more than one of the young artists had to be assured by the quilters their drawing was there. All found their contributions.

The remaining quilt was for the housemother, who is the center of the new St. Francis home. Gretchen's aunt, Vivian, is a professional quilter. She readily agreed to provide the quilt for the housemother. In the historic log cabin quilt pattern, each square contains a red pane in the center, often called the candlelight square, signifying the mother as the heart of the home. The quilt's warmth and love is just as important in this quilt, and its backing—a sea of small hearts—carries the message as well.

When each quilt is viewed from a slight distance, what stands out is that the center of each square—the art square—is the picture, and the surrounding fabric the frame. The children of the home in Masiphumelele, South Africa, may not remember each of the St. Peter's parishioners that make the long trip to visit and work on their new home. But they and their housemother will have something far more lasting—a constant reminder of God's love for them, in 120 separate statements from the youth of St. Peter's, Arlington, and tens of thousands of stitches by those who lovingly sewed each square.
